And the Twentieth day of May in the year of our Lord (according to
the Account kept in England) one thousand six hundred fifty eight
Mary Stapp of Newport Wagnell in the county of Surte Widdow, doeth in
body but of reasonable and disposing memory; doeth and ordaine this my last
will and Testament in manner and forme followinge (That is to say) I doe give
and devise unto Thomas Worrell Sonne of my sonne Thomas Worrell
and Mary my late daughter, and the heirs of Thomas my said Grandchild
All that my House, Garden and what dements in Newport Wagnell aforesaid
late bought by John Stapp my late husband, now deceased of Thomas
Wolter, George Kinge, and Joan his wife, some or one of them; to enter upon the
same when hee shall accomplish the age of one and twenty years And my will
and mandinge is, and I doe hereby desire John Cunningham and Andrew
Cunningham my Brothers, James Worrell of Milton in the said county
of Surte gentleman, and Robert Perrott of Newport Wagnell aforesaid
yeoman In the meane tyme to lett or otherwise dispose of the same, and to have
receave, and take the rents, issues, and profitts thereof, for the use and benefit of my
said Grandchild Thomas Worrell And also I doe give and devise unto Thomas
Worrell my said Sonne and his Assignes, for duringe, and until Thomas
my said Grandchild shall accomplish the age of one and twenty years All those
messuages, cottages or dements situate and beinge together in the
parish of saint Eadmours Southward in the county of Surte, Together
with all other hereditaments late deceased or devised to John Stapp my said
husband by Thomas Shackleton gentleman Provided that Thomas my said son
and his Assignes doe and shall forth, or out of the profitts of the said premises
yearly and every year until the time last aforesaid, well and truly pay
unto the said John Cunningham, Henry Cunningham, James Worrell and
Robert Perrott Tenne poundes of lawfull money of England to be employed
and imployed for the benefit of my said Grandchild Thomas Worrell: And
to be paid unto him all the accomplishment of his age of one and twenty years
In case hee bee then livinge; And in case hee bee then dead; Then unto Thomas
Worrell my said Sonne; And from and immediately after the accomplishment
of Thomas my said Grandchild's age of one and twenty years I give and
devise the said hereditaments unto Thomas Worrell my said Grandchild
and his Assignes duringe the thirtie yeeres of the said lease; And also I doe
give and bequeath unto Thomas Worrell my said Grandchild; Three hundred
poundes of good and lawfull money of England; to be paid unto the said John
Cunningham, Henry Cunningham, James Worrell and Robert Perrott
within two yeeres next after my decease; And to be paid unto Thomas Worrell
my said Grandchild all the accomplishment of his age of one and twenty years
And in the meane tyme my will and desire is that the same be imployed for the
benefitt and advantage of Thomas my said Grandchild; And in case Thomas
Worrell my said Grandchild shall dye and depart this life before hee shall accom-
plish his said age of one and twenty years; Then my will and mandinge is, and
I doe hereby give and bequeath these three hundred poundes hereafter mentioned, ad-
part and partell of the said three hundred poundes in manner followinge (That
is to say) To John Cunningham and Henry Cunningham my brothers, and
to Susan Clark and Sarah Stanlyon my sisters; Ten poundes apiece of
lawfull money of England; And to the poore of the parish of Newport Wagnell
aforesaid twenty poundes; And to John Cunningham, Joseph Cunningham,
Samuell Cunningham and Mary Cunningham, the four children of my said

I, Robert John Dunningham Ten pounds a piece of lawfull money of England
as part and parcel of the said three hundred pounds, to be paid unto them at
their severall and respective ages of one and twenty years And in the mean
time to be imprisoned for their benefitts; And my will and meaning is that
in case any of my said Brother John Dunningham's children shall dye and
depart this life before his, her, or their legacies or legacies shall be come due and payabell
as afore said; that then the legacies or legacies of him, her, or them so dying as afore
said shall be paid to the survivor or survivors of them equally betwixt them
at their severall and respective ages of one and twenty years And also I doo
give and bequeath as part and parcel of the said three hundred pounds to Samuell
Dunningham, Thomas Dunningham, and Mary Dunningham, the three
children of my said brother Henry Dunningham, Ten pounds a piece of
lawfull money of England to be paid unto them at their severall and
respective ages of one and twenty years; And in the mean time to be im-
prisoned for their benefitts; And my will and meaning is that in case any
of my said brother Henry Dunningham's children shall dye and depart
this life before his, her, or their legacies or legacies shall be come due and pay-
abell as afore said; that then the legacies or legacies of him, her, or them so dy-
ing as afore said, shall be paid to the survivor or survivors of them equally
betwixt them at their severall and respective ages of one and twenty years
And my will and meaning is that Thomas Morrell my said sonne shall have
all the rest and residue of the said three hundred pounds In case my said
Grandchild Thomas Morrell shall dye and depart this life before the accomplish-
ment of his age of one and twenty years; And also I doo give and bequeath
unto Thomas Morrell my said Grandchild one chest with all the linen,
Gold rings, plates, and all other things therein And also my silver Tankards, my
silver beaker, my silver porringers, three silver spoons and all other my plate
And also I doo give and bequeath unto John Dunningham and Henry Dunning-
ham my said brothers, the said James Morrell and Robert Morrell, the summe
of Ten pounds of lawfull money of England to be paid unto them for the pur-
chase and placing forth as an Apprentice John Meeke sonne of Marto Meeke
of Ellington, at the age of sixteen years And also I doo give and bequeath unto
James Meeke my said servant five pounds of lawfull money of England to be
paid within one year next after my decease And also I doo give and bequeath unto
the poore people of Newport Magdalen aforesaid five pounds to be distributed at
the discretion of my Executors and Overseers hereafter named All these things
and duties of my goods and Chattels (my debts and legacies being first paid and
full payment made and odde and sold Executor of this my
last will and Testament I have devised that my said sonne Thomas Morrell
shall have and enjoy the said goods, doo well and sufficiently provide and main-
tain and bring up Thomas Morrell my said Grandchild with a good
nourish, drinke, and all other things fitting and needfull for him, until
he shall accomplish the age of one and twenty years; And I doo hereby
renew and revoke all other wills and Testaments by me formerly
made And I doo hereby nominate and devise John Dunningham and Henry
Dunningham my said brothers, and the said James Morrell and Robert
Morrell to be Overseers of this my last will and Testament And to appoynt
and assist my said Executors in the performance thereof; And I doo give and bequeath
unto them for their said service Twenty shillings a piece And witness whereof I have
hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year first above written. The

This will was proued at **London** the two and twentieth day of July in the year of our Lord God Six thousand six hundred fifty and eight Before the Judge for probate of Wills and granting Administration lawfully authorized by the oath of Thomas Morvall the sonne and sole Executor named in the said will To whom Administration of all and singular the goods Chattels and Debts of the said Deceased was committed who being first legally sworn truly to administer the same

William Snaypp of Great Horwood in the countie of Bucks Esquire being sick in body but whole in minde and of perfect memory thanked be to Almighty God, Do make and ordaine this my last will and Testament upon the four and twentieth day of May in the year of our Lord God Six thousand six hundred fifty and eight, Revokinge and annullinge all former wills and Testaments in manner and forme as followeth First I bequeath my Soule to the hands of Almighty God my maker; Whose will I hope to be saved by the merits of Christ Jesus my Redeemer, And my Body to Christian buriall, to be buried in the Churchyard of Great Horwood And as for my worldly goods wherewith I hath pleased God to bless me and endow me withall I will and bequeath in manner and forme as followeth I give and bequeath to the poore of the parish of Great Horwood ffortie shillings of lawfull money to be paid to them all the end and terme of one year after my decease by the discretion of my Executor; Againe and bequeath unto the poore of the parish of Little Horwood Sixte shillings eight pence of lawfull money to be paid to them all the end and terme of one year after my decease by the discretion of my Executor Againe and bequeath unto my sonne William Snaypp the sonne of my brother Edward Snaypp ffortie poundes of lawfull money to be paid unto him all the end and terme of two years after my decease Againe and bequeath unto my sonne Richard Atwell the sonne of my sister Francis Atwell of Edlesborough Twentie Nobles of lawfull money; Unto Moyses to be paid unto him all the end and terme of one year after my decease; And the other Moyses to be paid unto him all the end and terme of two years after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto John Snaypp the sonne of my brother John Snaypp Thirtie shillings of lawfull money to be paid unto him all the end and terme of two years after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto Richard Snaypp the sonne of my brother John Snaypp Thirtie shillings of lawfull money to be paid unto him all the end and terme of two years after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto William Snaypp and Anne Snaypp the sonne and daughter of my brother John Snaypp Thirtie shillings apiece to be paid unto them all the end and terme of two years after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto John Snaypp Gabriel Snaypp, Richard Snaypp and Anne Snaypp the sonne and daughter of my brother Edward Snaypp Thirtie shillings apiece of lawfull money to be paid unto them all the end and terme of two years after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto my sonne Edward Snaypp the sonne of my brother Edward Snaypp ffind shillings of lawfull money to be paid unto him all the end and terme of one year after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto Nathaniell Atwell and Deborah Atwell the sonne and daughter of my sister Francis Atwell of Edlesborough Twentie shillings apiece of lawfull money to be paid unto them all the end and terme of two years after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto Samuel Atwell the sonne of my sister Francis Atwell Thirtie shillings of lawfull money to be paid unto him all the end of two years after my decease; Againe and bequeath unto Francis
